Get Involved in Wisconsin Conservation

Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) is looking for 2022 <u>summer interns!</u> WDNR's State of Wisconsin Student Diversity Internship Program offers <u>paid positions</u> in all six divisions within WDNR across the state to students with diverse backgrounds and interests. Internship areas include fish and wildlife biology, hydrogeology, communications, education, and air management.
