WGF and Clean Wisconsin Launch 2-year Project to Re-envision Farm Conservation





Sarah Walling, Water and Agriculture Program Director at of Clean Wisconsin, will co-lead the project with WGF's Executive Director, Fred Clark. WGF's Farm Conservation Work Group leaders Paul LaLiberte, Jim Baumann, Jim Matson, and WGF member experts in farm conservation, will also guide the project. Sara Walling told us, "Through this work we'll have a chance to bring together key stakeholders who can help us re-envision farm conservation in Wisconsin. learning generated by this work will bring multiple benefits, and the relationships we'll build will help create the foundation to make these ideas a reality."

With support from the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, Wisconsin's Green Fire and Clean Wisconsin are launching a two-year project to assess feasibility and design a new model for farm incentive programs.

While Wisconsin farmers have a long tradition as committed conservationists, market realities and the current structure of government farm incentive programs too often result in failure to protect water quality in farm country. As a result, contamination of water supplies from phosphorus, nitrates, and bacteria still threatens human health and the environment - affecting an increasing number of rural residents in Wisconsin and surrounding regions. We believe that more positive outcomes are possible if we reassess our investments in farm conservation through voluntary efforts.

WGF members have been working for several years on better methods to use our investments that support farmers and farm conservation. We believe this is a powerful idea whose time has arrived, and we're excited to be launching a significant effort to test these ideas at scale.

As the project launches, we'll be bringing on dedicated staff and a larger team of stakeholders to help develop and refine ideas and envision new ways of supporting farmers while conserving working lands and our state's most precious resource, clean water.

WGF Pilots Northern Lakes Toolbox Workshops

Wisconsin's lakes are one of its most valued resources. University of Wisconsin Extension estimates 750 lake associations and districts work on stewardship across the state representing thousands of lakeshore owners and enthusiasts. While many training

opportunities exist, fully engaging in lake management is often beyond the capacity of lake groups. To address this need, WGF piloted two Northern Lakes Toolbox Workshops in August and September. The goal is to provide lake leaders with tools to obtain and interpret data about their lake – and to use the information to make lake planning and management decisions. The primary data source is the WDNR Lakes Program. The sessions included Tribal perspectives presented by Lac du Flambeau Tribal Natural Resources Director, Celeste Hockings.

Twelve lake association leaders from Vilas County, Oneida and Iron Counties participated. One participant observed, "There is a lot of data out there and I now have a better idea how to get at the data to help define an action plan to improve and maintain the health of our lake."

When asked what they would do with the skills and information, lake leaders were enthusiastic. One participant said, "I will recommend applying for programs/grants for our lake for aquatic invasive species education and increased water monitoring." Another was interested in attending the session for a second time to learn more about how varied lakes would benefit.

Based on the results of these pilots, WGF may offer sessions to reach broader audiences, including at the 2024 Wisconsin Lakes
Conference. Funding was provided by the Arthur L. and Elaine V. Johnson Foundation, WDNR Surface Water Grants (Lake Education), with Wisconsin's Green Fire providing inkind support. The Toolbox Workshops will be featured at WGF's
Conservation Social in Manitowish Waters on October 18. Join us there

And in your Careers Corner, here are three reasons why I volunteer:

My conservation career pathway began as a volunteer at a local nature preserve owned by the Massachusetts Audubon Society. I started because I needed scheduled and structured outdoors time because I wasn't making it for myself! And then I discovered that I was building skills in trail maintenance, birding, species identification and invasive species removal. Key conservation skills. So my manager became a job reference for me when I was ready for my first job in conservation work at Philmont Scout Ranch's Conservation Department.

- 1. Growing a skillset: by volunteering with Nearby Nature, a Milwaukee conservation group, and birding weekly through migration and breeding season, I was able to hone my bird calls and song skills. And I know my walk in the woods was helpful!
- 2. **Networking:** I have been able to build relationships that carry over into my professional sphere like <u>hosting Black Birder's Week at the Zoo</u> in partnership with Nearby Nature.
- 3. **My next job:** I have leveraged the unpaid experiences and skills from volunteering into getting a job. Volunteering demonstrates a willingness to be a team-player and that you're active in your community. Both, in addition the skill-building, are attractive to employers.


