A Busy Week at the Capitol for WGF





During the week of October 6, 2025, Wisconsin's Green Fire (WGF) leaders testified at the Wisconsin State Capitol on multiple bills. The main topics were on forestry and PFAS. Meleesa Johnson, Executive Director, testified "for information only" on the sustainable aviation biofuel bill, SB 456 (see picture above by Sarah Barry). John Robinson, Chair of WGF's Contaminants of Emerging Concern Work Group testified in opposition to the PFAS bills, SB 127 and SB 128.

Even more happening behind the scenes

With so much happening at the federal and state levels, many parts of our work aren't publicized on the WGF website or social media. Below, we list some examples from the past month. Several other longer-term projects are also underway.

- US Forest Service We sent a comment letter to District Rangers of Wisconsin's Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest about technical recommendations for the North Branch Vegetation Project. Our comments are about boreal birds, stands older than 1917, hemlock regeneration and other concerns.
- Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) -
 - Comments on NR 809 regarding PFAS
 - Comments on the Draft Wisconsin Wildlife Action Plan
 - Participating in the Beaver Management Plan Committee
- Wisconsin Legislature
 - Participating in a panel at the State Capitol on "Why Forestry and Forest Products Matter in Wisconsin."


