Balancing Solar Energy and Conservation of Rare Birds

When the nation's second-largest solar farm was proposed in Central Wisconsin adjacent to some of the state's only nesting habitat for greater prairie-chickens (a state-threatened bird species), we assembled an interdisciplinary team of WGF experts on wildlife, energy development, fisheries, and water resources.

Our work helped achieve science-based compromises in the design of the solar array locations to be farther from prairie-chicken nesting areas. We emphasized the need for both responsible siting of renewable energy and conservation of public lands and wildlife like these iconic birds.

Injuries and Deaths of Large Non-hunted Wild Birds

Based on five years of data provided by a sample of Wisconsin wildlife rehabilitation centers, we published our Phase 1 report on illegal deaths and injuries to Wisconsin's large non-hunted wild birds like cranes, eagles, hawks, loons, owls and other species. You can read the report on the WGF website.

Also in 2024, we began Phase 2 of this project. Phase 2 includes organizing and analyzing a broader statewide dataset to better understand patterns in the threats these birds face and the needs of the wildlife rehabilitator community.

Some key concerns are shootings, collisions, lead poisoning, and diseases like avian influenza which can affect other wild and domestic animals and people.

Speaking up for Science and Sandhill Cranes



Meleesa Johnson served on the legislative study committee on sandhill cranes, tackling issues of agricultural impacts and a potential sandhill crane hunting season. We advocated for a science-based approach including an updated crane management plan.

Policy work with PFAS and Water

Throughout 2024, we continued our work advancing a science-based approach to dealing with PFAS contamination in Wisconsin. These "forever chemicals" cause environmental and human health problems in communities around Wisconsin. PFAS in drinking water is our main focus. We also are focused on PFAS in soil, particularly in the impacts of land spreading biosolids that contain PFAS.

Notable work in 2024 included helping stop Senate Bill 312 which contained a "poison pill" to limit powers to hold polluters accountable via the Spills Law. Efforts by WGF and our PFAS coalition partners succeeded when Gov. Evers vetoed the bill. Although the \$125 million remains unavailable to WI communities in the state's PFAS Trust Fund, we remained involved in ongoing water quality monitoring of PFAS and navigating changes in federal standards for PFAS in drinking water.

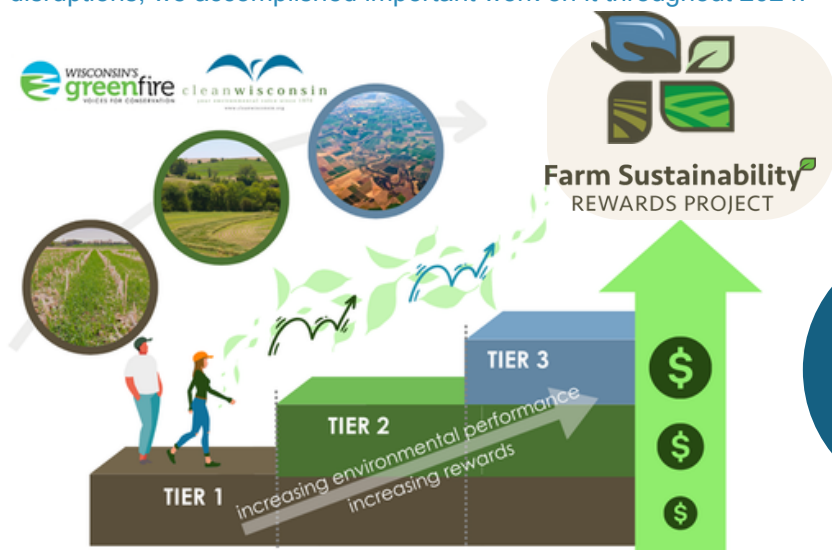
2nd Annual WI Conservation Retreat for students and professionals, Jan. 2024

Farm Sustainability Rewards (FSR) Project*

WGF continued designing and modeling a new approach to incentivizing on-farm conservation. We collaborated with Clean Wisconsin and a team of project advisors, with support from the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service. Using data from real Wisconsin farms, the project focused on ways to reward farmers who meet increasing tiers of environmental performance. The focus areas were reducing runoff from phosphorus and nitrogen and reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

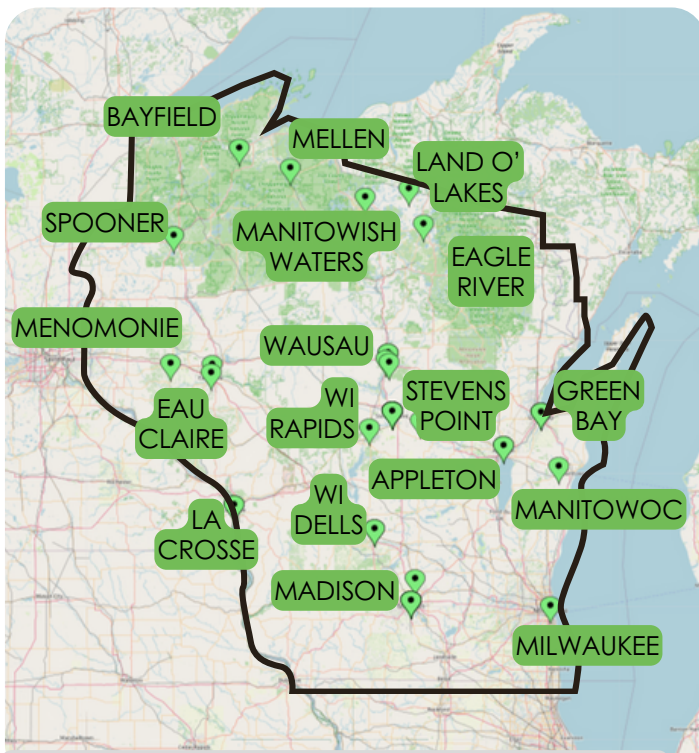

The Effects of Wake Boats on Lake Ecosystem Health: A Literature Review

In May 2024, we published our literature review white paper on how wake-enhanced boating can impact lake ecosystems. The lead author is WGF Conservation Fellow, David Ortiz, a PhD student at UW-Madison. WGF experts served as coauthors and editors. Together, this paper synthesizes the best-available science on wake boats and lakes to date and points out gaps where more research is needed. The five main themes are: 1) aquatic invasive species, 2) shoreline erosion, 3) aquatic plants, 4) sediment resuspension and water column mixing, and 5) birds and fish.

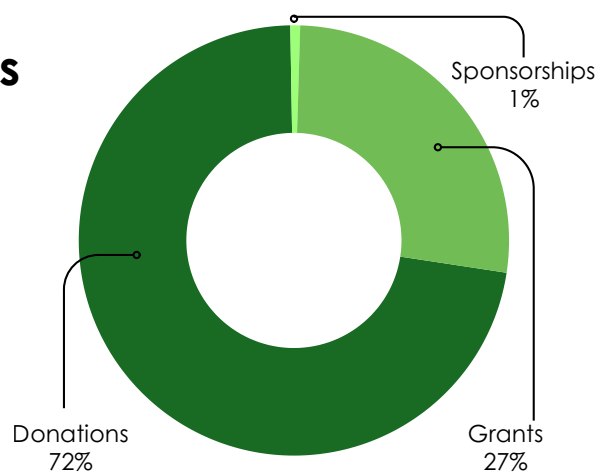

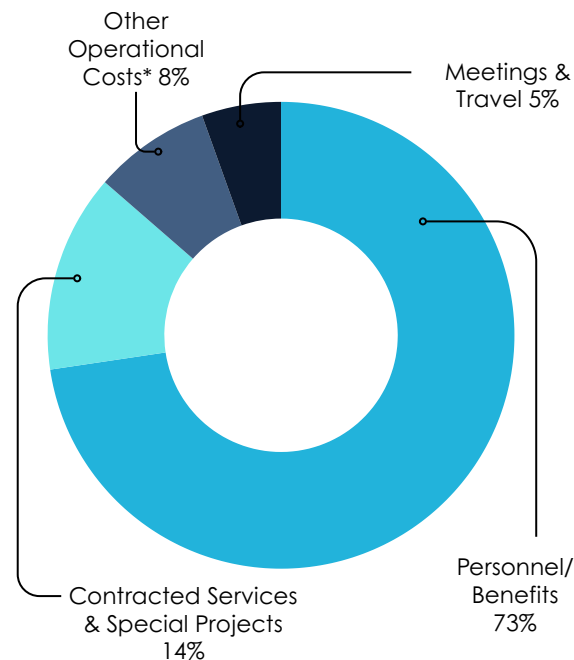
